


Creating Videos on an iPad



Creating A Movie on an iPad


1. Turn on your iPad and select the Camera App. 
2. Slide from "Photo" to "Video"
 - . The screen now reflects what the iPad lens will be filming away from you.
 - . If you want to film yourself, click on the small camera icon. Instantaneously, the iPad will no longer film away from you, but will film you.
3. Click the red circle to begin filming. Notice the timer. This allows you to see if filming is actually taking place.
 - . Click the red square to end filming.
4. The iPad is ready for you to begin filming another video.




Viewing The Movie You Just Filmed

if you would like to view the video you just created, click on the image in the bottom corner. You have now entered the Camera Roll. This is where all your videos and photos are stored. The first thing that will appear is the last film or photo you took, in this case it is your video. To view it, click on the arrow in the middle of the video. Notice the Film Strip at the top of the video, you can see the play head moving across it as you view the video. You can drag this play head either forward or backward to the exact spot in the video that you would like to view.

Cropping The Movie



1. If you would like to delete a portion of the beginning or end of the film, take your finger and click and hold the **black** arrow at the beginning or end of the film clip. Notice how the arrow is no longer surrounded by black but **gold** and there should be a thin **gold line** surrounding the film clip (if not, try it again). Drag your finger toward the center of the video and at some point release.



2. Notice the "Trim" button in the top corner. if you were to select it, everything that is faded on the video clip would be deleted and everything that is surrounded in gold will be kept. Go ahead, try it...select "Trim" (I am assuming you are practicing on a video clip you don't mind losing.). Two options will appear: "Trim Original" and "Save as New Clip." This is nice because you can keep an unaltered original and trim the copy.
